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METHODOLOGY

Survey results are based on 1,003 telephone interviews conducted between January 11 and 25, 2000, as mandated by Reader's Digest (Canada) Ltd.

Eligible respondents reached by CROP were residents of Canada, members of a household that was reachable by telephone, 16 to 18 years of age and able to complete a telephone interview in French or English.

The sample of telephone numbers was drawn from published lists of telephone subscribers in Canada according to a random sampling model. The 1,003 young Canadians who met the study criteria were found through approximately 13,000 telephone calls placed by CROP¹. For survey purposes, Canada was subdivided into five regions: Maritimes, Quebec, Ontario, Prairies and British Columbia.

Interviews were conducted from CROP's call centre in Montreal. The survey exhibited a 61% response rate.

For purposes of analysis, results were weighted according to demographic statistics from the 1996 annual census, in order to reflect the distribution of this population in terms of age, sex and region.

From a statistical point of view, such a sample size (n=1,003) is precise to within 3 percentage points, 19 times out of 20. However, this margin of error increases when results are based on sub-samples.
